Huron Street Trunkline Bridge Retrofit | 1 CM Law

Built in the late 1960s, the Huron Street & I-94 interchange converted Ypsilanti's urban grid to a series of one-way pairs and left the freeway bridge with only vehicle accommodations. In 2023, a multi-use pathway over the freeway connecting City and Township and bike lanes connecting MDOT roads to the City's non-motorized network will be completed.
