

The largest single demographic in rural MI is age 65+


Housing shortages and childcare create local/regional challenges in attracting population to new jobs and other opportunities

# Rural Michigan can lead the way for statewide resilience

2023 Rural Preferences & Priorities Survey showed **'place'** – location, recreation, schools, community connections – was a key driver for decisions to stay or relocate to rural areas

## Two-thirds thought their community was moving in the right direction

Community planning initiatives were seen as a catalyst for improvements/positive change in direction




Grow and diversify the workforce across sectors

### **Rural Readiness Grant Program**

\$50,000 (20% match, in-kind or cash) awards to local governments and tax-exempt organizations are eligible

Internships and fellowship opportunities are filling capacity gaps around grant writing

Grant writing supports and education and giving communities tools for planning and grant administration

Housing strategies and community engagement are building knowledge, expertise, plans, and partnerships New staff and organizational infrastructure are attracting partners and developers and preparing land for housing

Shared infrastructure is helping organizations to successfully deliver critical community services, including health/behavioral health, food access, emergency response, and other services.

Coordinated, statewide planning to connect and address land and water management, population and workforce, infrastructure, housing, and energy




